John Dominic Crossan, Professor Emeritus of Religious Studies, DePaul University, Chicago will present lectures on April 20 and 21, entitled “The Historical Jesus, Then and Now; the Challenge of the Kingdom of God.”

9:00 a.m. – 10:30 a.m., “The Death of Jesus”

The series will explore: who the real Jesus of history was and what He really said; the places where Jesus taught and preached; the people Jesus lived among and healed; life as Jesus might have known it 2,000 years ago; what Jesus may have experienced; the opportunity to reframe the Jesus of faith as you experience more closely the Jesus of history; experiencing Jesus as you may never have thought possible.

The fee for the series is \$25 per person. Registration deadline is April 6. You may send your check to the church office; please include a self-addressed, stamped envelope to receive your tickets.

Dr. Crossan was a member of the 13th-century Roman Catholic religious order, the Servites, from 1950 to 1969 and an ordained priest from 1957 to 1969. He taught at DePaul University for 25 years and held a visiting professorship at Williams College, Williamstown, Massachusetts. He was co-director of the Jesus Seminar from 1985-1996 and chair of the Historical Jesus Section of the Society of Biblical Literature from 1992-1998.

Dear Friends in Christ,

Death is large. Everything that lives will die.

All those whom we love are, day by day, headed towards death's door. In an essay entitled, "Death in the Open" in *The Lives of Cells*, biologist Lewis Thomas speaks honestly and directly of the largeness of death:

"The obituary pages tell us of the news that we are dying off, while the birth announcements in finer print,

off at the side of the page, inform us of our replacements, but we get no grasp from this of the enormity of scale. There are 3 billion of us on the earth, and all 3 billion must be dead, on schedule, within this lifetime. The vast mortality, involving something over 50 million of us each year, takes place in relative secrecy. We can only really know of the deaths in our households, or among our friends. These, detached in our minds from the rest, we take to be unnatural events, anomalies, outrages. We speak of our own dead in low voices; struck down, we say, as though visible death can only occur for cause, by disease, or violence, avoidably. We send off flowers, grieve, make ceremonies, scatter bones, unaware of the rest of the 3 billion on the same schedule. All that immense mass of flesh and bone and consciousness will disappear by absorption into the earth, without recognition by the transient survivors."

Death is large. Easter is larger.

Easter is not just about Jesus. It is even more about God getting God's way with the world. Easter is about God getting the last word in the story and the last word was life, not death.

Death is large. Easter is larger and is the last word.

A communist lecturer in Russia once ended a lecture with the following words: "Therefore, there is no God: Jesus Christ never existed; there is no such thing as a Holy Spirit." With that, he sat down. A priest stood up after the lecture and shouted, "Christ is Risen!" The crowd shouted, "He is risen indeed." Beyond all argument, proof or magical thinking, comes a gift that is larger than death. And, like a good joke, you either get it or you don't.

"Made like him, like him we rise." Get it? Even if you don't get it, God is going to do that with you anyway. Then you'll finally get it.

April 8, Easter Day. We celebrate the Risen Christ

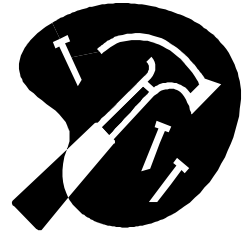

Katrina Kare A Vans



Katrina Kare-a-Vans is a project that grew out of the church mission trip to New Orleans in November 2006. That work involved the rehabilitation of individual homes that were ravaged by Hurricane Katrina and the resultant flooding. The Kare-a-Vans project has been created to provide home furnishings to those families whose houses have been rebuilt. Good quality home furnishings are being collected and prepared for personal delivery to these homes.

We are collecting good quality clean upholstered and wooden furniture, household accessories, kitchenware, prints, lamps and mirrors. Each client has an individual from our church working with an individual from Cliff's church to help determine priorities for furnishings. Our April trip will include a load of furnishings for four separate homes.

This will be an ongoing effort and there will be more families to help as their houses become finished. We are in need of home furnishings, volunteers to help “decorate” client's homes long distance, the loan of a large truck and some help with “fixing up” some of the donated furnishings. Stephen Ministry

Reflections from our Stephen Ministers

I had been asked by numerous people to consider applying, (to be a Stephen Minister) but I thought it was for "special people"--- not for me. After a strong nudge from someone very close to me, I said I would pray about it, and I asked God for a sign. Two days later, after a short conversation with a very special friend who said "You should be a Stephen Minister!" I told her the story. She immediately said, "Consider me your sign!" I applied and have been so grateful for this wonderful opportunity.

I have unquestionably received far more out of serving in this ministry than I will ever be able to give.

Stephen Ministry has so wonderfully equipped me to handle very difficult "life" situations with care receivers, but recently so beautifully it has equipped me to feel I could handle challenging situations in my family's life. One of the basic rules of Stephen Ministry is to listen!!! And, do so, reflectively. In Stephen Ministry we are taught to "be in the moment" with our care receiver – in other words, focus. A family member, in talking to me last week about her situation, almost repeated that rule to me verbatim---"you always seem so here with me and so focused on my life". As tears came to my eyes, I could feel God's presence.



Service for Stephen Ministry is one way I would serve my church community if I lived near (my family). Perhaps service-oriented individuals may some day help my family and friends--so I guess, in a way, I'm trying to pay it forward!

Stephen Ministry has equipped me not only to help others in the Stephen Ministry program, but also for tough situations in all phases of my life.

I wanted to serve the church community in ways that coincide with my personality. I work best one-on-one and with small groups. Stephen Ministry is set up so that we listen, reflect, and walk with one person in crisis. Then we work in small supervision groups in order to assure we provide the best possible Christian care for our care receivers.

I feel so blessed to have fallen into this ministry, that I cannot imagine not being a Stephen Minister.

Stephen Ministers from our church wrote these reflections. Not only do the Care Receivers benefit from loving, God-centered listening, this program too blesses Stephen Ministers. After two days of spiritual reflection and fellowship at the Women's Retreat this weekend, we worshipped God and shared the Bread and the Cup. nurture each other, and have Christ at the center of their lives.

What does it cost? Nothing. Who can do it? Anyone.

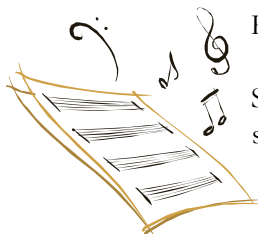
Gaudete Brass Concert, Sunday, April 22, 4:00 p.m.

Youth Mission Trip 2007: Change of Destination

We will now be traveling to Welch, West Virginia. The director of the Presbyterian Disaster Aid program with whom we will be working contacted us with a proposal. The agency wanted to open a new site and wondered if we would be interested in being the first group there. The need is great, and our years of mission trip experience would stand us in good stead. After discussion, the decision was made to take on this challenge. Look for pictures and posters of our site in Fellowship Hall.

Here is a little background from Joan Stewart, Director of WVMAW: Welch used to be a big coal mining town of 50,000 people. As the mines played out and machinery replaced the need for people, folks left the area. Unemployment is high, and McDowell County is one of the poorest counties in the United States. In 2001 two 500 year floods hit the county and nearly devastated certain areas. But the people are tough. With the help of long term recovery committees (including WVMAW) and mission work, people began to get needed help. Poverty compounds disaster, and poverty is a major issue that has compounded disaster there. Addiction is rampant. But an amazing thing is happening in Welch. It was once a ghost town, but people are working hard to make it vital again.

The ministerial association just opened I AM Coffee--a coffee shop run by the association as a non-profit, set up to be a place for meeting and prayer and with a vision of opening a half way house in the future. Suddenly the city GAVE the ministerial association a building to be used as a half way house. They believe that if folks can get dry and then get a chance perhaps they can break the cycle. The building was damaged in the flood and not touched. So mission groups will be doing deconstruction, reconstruction and renovation to make it livable.

The Presbyterian Church has Project HOPE that is much like an after school program for children, only it continues year round. They offer art programs for students, including guitar and piano lessons, computer classes, and digital camera lessons. They have asked us to tell this to mission groups who may have those with gifts to offer someone for the week.

In June, we'll hold our "Ladies Day" luncheon at Biltmore Country Club.

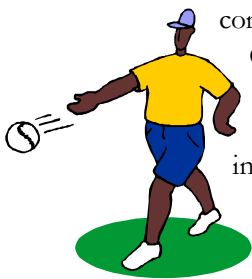
