Dear Friends in Christ,

I am writing this article just three days before my daughter, Sarah's, marriage to Mark Jeffrey Garrette, Jr. The Garrettes and Baxters would like to take this opportunity to thank our church family for its overwhelming support during this joyous time in our lives. We will never be able to thank you enough for your kindness and generosity. Weddings almost always result in both families having a family reunion. Family reunions are wonderful and sometimes a bit awkward. If everybody comes, you are faced with the prospect of a mixed bag of great pleasure and some pain.

The biennial General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) is more than a little like that. Every two years we get together and discuss family business. In the two most hotly debated issues, the General Assembly continues to hold out the threat of divestment as a last resort from American corporate interests supporting Israel's military interests, but it apologized both to American Jews and to Presbyterians who were offended by the last Assembly's action. It also emphasized the importance of investing in Israel and Palestinian groups which are building peace whenever possible, rather than divestment. Many in the Jewish community in this country have welcomed that change of heart. In the matter of ordination, the

Theological Task Force Report, which offered a plan for Presbyterians to live together in a time of strong theological disagreement, was approved by 57 percent of the Assembly. This compromise report relies on an historic approach to declaring an exception to the church's teaching, the local session and presbytery can determine whether individual persons may be ordained even though they do not uphold a particular teaching of the church.

Like a family reunion, the essence of the thing is being there with all of the mixed emotions, pride, embarrassment, and feelings that attend it. We are a mainline Protestant denomination existing in a time when mainline Protestantism is on the decline. Like politics, all church life these days is local (more or less), and yet nothing is more frightening to a dyed-in-the-wool Presbyterian than the threat of creeping congregationalism. We are a "connectional church" with national standards and historic creeds, and we are not free to believe whatever we choose. We assert this reality, however, in a time when fewer and fewer people join a church or attend a worship service because it is connected to a national denomination. People make choices about what church they will attend based on factors that center on personal need and interest, like whether the church encourages their family, nurtures their children, supports their marriage, or provides help for spiritual searching.

Of course, as a Presbyterian minister, I am discouraged by this trend, but I understand it. The church has disappointed many people. Many clergy are viewed with suspicion because of the few who have failed their congregations. Denominational churches spend too much time fighting internally and not enough time exemplifying the love and peace of Christ. And too many people come to church spiritually hungry and go away unfed. Nevertheless, every week communities rely on their local church to provide outreach to the homeless and needy, and provide glorious worship to praise God and inspire faith. Every day, ministers counsel people who are broken in spirit and are looking for hope to go on. Like a family reunion, the good outweighs the bad by a long shot.

Nominating Committee Seeks Officers for 2007 -2009 term

The congregation's Nominating Committee invites your input as we search for people to serve us as church officers and as members of next years Nominating Committee. The Officer candidates will be presented to the congregation and elected in October 2006 to take office in January 2007 serving three year terms ending in December 2009. Nominating Committee members are voted on at the same time to serve a one year term. The committee will take into consideration all potential candidates, but remember, not everyone recommended is willing to serve or meets the qualifications we are looking for in any given year. Please submit your recommendation no later than AUGUST 13.

The following officers are being sought to serve for a three-year term:

Seven Elder Nominees: Elders serve on the Session, which is the governing board of the congregation. The Session has oversight of all church programs, budgeting, and use of the church building. Elders chair the church committees. Elders are ordained to this office.

Six Deacon Nominees: The Board of Deacons, working under the direction of the Session carries out ministries of pastoral care and hospitality. Deacons are ordained to this office.

Four Trustee Nominees: The Board of Trustees, under the direction of the Session, oversees the maintenance of the church buildings and property. Trustees manage the church finances. Trustees are installed to this office.

Five Members-at Large from the congregation will be needed to serve a one year term on the Nominating Committee from January 2007 through December 2007. The Nominating Committee meets annually to consider new officers. They also provide training for new incoming officers each November.

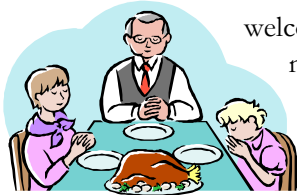
Morning Bible Study

Stephen Ministry

“Lord, you have searched me and known me.
You know when I sit down and when I rise up;
You discern my thoughts from far away.
You search out my path and my lying down,
and are acquainted with all my ways.
Even before a word is on my tongue,
O Lord, you know it completely.”

Psalm 139: 1-4

God does know our hearts, our thoughts, our burdens. But sometimes those who surround us feel that we have it “all together,” that our crisis is now over and we can continue on alone. When people go through a crisis they receive a lot of attention and support. The church, family, friends, and neighbors are there to help; but what about a couple of months later? Typically the level of attention, support, and care drops off, but the person’s need for care may well grow.

The need for follow-up care can be easy to miss. Because we are expected to have “moved on” from the crisis, we may be reluctant to admit we need to deal with these additional issues and thus do not seek out help, even from friends or family members. That is why the follow-up care that Stephen Ministers provide is so valuable. They focus on one care receiver, and

only their need for care. They also continue the caring relationship for as long as the care receiver needs it.

For example:

A congregation member undergoes major surgery and receives care related to a number of immediate crisis needs. The surgery is successful and the person goes home. A few weeks later, however, the person is overcome by deep grief.

A member received significant support from the pastor and the congregation when a family member died a year ago. She has been managing well, but now finds herself experiencing renewed feelings of anger and loneliness.

Caring Hearts - Faithful Servants. “Called by God” -- We hear this in sermons, prayers and ordinations but do we think about what it means? God’s call rarely comes with a bolt of lightning and a conversation with Yahweh. Are you ready for a life-transforming experience participating in and leading a small group? Take some time to think it over. Ask questions about it; discuss it with your friends. Talk to one of our current small group leaders. Take this opportunity to bless and influence the lives of others as your own relationship with Christ grows deeper and more fulfilling.

He came with his wife to the USA in the 1950's, and got a job in a metal working shop. He went by streetcar from their one bedroom basement flat (shared with their sponsor) to work. Natural intelligence and hard working habits enabled him to save enough money after a few years to buy into a very small metal working shop. Through the years he grew that company until by the time he sold it in 2000 he employed over 3000 people in four plants, one of which was in Ireland. Come hear Hans' amazing story. Missions in Chicago Thank you

The Mission Committee would like to thank you in the congregation who so generously donated to One Great Hour of Sharing. Out of abundance and gratitude we gave to the work of the greater church \$4,665.34.

The following grants were approved by the Committee on the Self-Development of People of the Presbytery of Chicago for 2006. \$5,000 each to **Comite Mujer of the San Lucas Workers Center**, a group of women day laborers fighting for the rights of women facing obstacles in working; **Marimba Oxib K'ajau**, Guatemalan Cultural Group, which focuses on teaching youth about their cultural heritage, especially the national instrument of Guatemala, the Marimba, and keeping them away from street violence; **Messiah-St. Bartholomew Development Center**, where a Culinary Alumni team has volunteered to train new students in a 12 week program open to all disadvantaged families in Chicago; **Women Standing in the Gap**, a program to assist communities in educating, encouraging, inspiring and uplifting individuals affected by MS. \$3,500 goes to **Metropolitan Area Group for Igniting Civilization, Inc.** This project was organized to reignite the Woodlawn neighborhood by organizing residents and resources in order to instill pride, dignity, energy, and self help to the subpopulations that live there and feel they are not worthy of providing input in major community decisions. \$2,500 goes to **The Urban Teen Magazine**, students in this project create their own publication, the project provides a means for youth to develop publishing skills, professional discipline and focus on critical workplace skills. \$2,000 each went to **Driving Englewood Above the Rim**, this group addresses the high lead poison contamination in their community by informing and helping to educate the ways of detecting and eliminating this deadly source of contamination; and to **Link for Life**, the mission of this project is to improve the quality of life of people who fall below the federal guidelines of poverty by forming personal productive relationships.
