**A**dvent is a time of anticipation, reflection and preparation. We anticipate the birth of the Christ child, we reflect on the past year and we prepare for the joyous season and the year ahead. There are many opportunities during the season for you to participate in activities and Worship services.

**November 30**, Worship at 9:00 a.m. and 11:00 a.m. First Sunday of Advent. We light the first candle with the hope and desire for the coming of the Lord.

**December 7**, Worship at 9:00 a.m. and 11:00 a.m. Second Sunday of Advent. We light the second candle calling us to a faith that God's Kingdom will come.

**December 7**, Caroling to members who are home-bound, 3:00 p.m. Advent Dinner, 5:30 p.m. – bring a hot dish or salad to share. Program presented by the Wednesday Night Live Dove Club.

**December 14**, Worship at 9:00 a.m. and 11:00 a.m. Third Sunday of Advent. We light the third candle with the Good News that the broken-hearted will be healed and those who are held captive will be set free.

**December 21**, Worship at 9:00 a.m. and 11:00 a.m. Fourth Sunday of Advent Lessons and Carols. We light the fourth candle symbolizing peace, because our all-powerful God is merciful and cares for the humble.



**December 24**, Family Worship and Communion at 5:00 p.m. We light the Christ candle and from that each person receives the light of Christ. Jesus said, "I am the light of the world, whoever follows me will not walk in darkness, but will have the light of life." Children of all ages are encouraged to attend.

**December 24**, Candlelight Services and Communion at 7:00 p.m., 9:00 p.m. and 11:00 p.m. We light the Christ candle as we proclaim Christ as the Light of the world; each person then receives the light of Christ as we sing Silent Night.

Dear Friends in Christ,

At sunrise on the morning of September 23, 63 B.C.E., a messenger ran through the streets of Rome announcing that "The ruler of the world is born." The child's name was Octavius. At age 20, he joined Marc Anthony to defeat those who had assassinated Julius Caesar. At age 33, he defeated Anthony and his co-conspirator, Cleopatra, and declared to the Roman Senate that he was to be known as Caesar Augustus.

At his bidding armies moved, ships sailed, and his enemies fell before him like grain before the scythe. When he was 66 years old, he stood astride the world like a colossus. In that year, in a remote village of no consequence, another birth was announced. "To you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is Christ the Lord." Octavius never dreamed that this fragile, powerless baby would one day conquer Death and overcome the world.

The church never tires of this story. In fact, the church relishes in both the joy and surprise of this story. On one level, we cheer the triumph of the powerless over the powerful. But on a deeper level, the news that God has come to live among us is greeted with joy. Why are we surprised? There really should be none because we know that it is God's nature to come to us in times of need. Perhaps the surprise is not in God's coming but in the manner of God's coming. Perhaps we are afraid that when God arrives in our midst the end of the world will also come. Hence, we are surprised that Advent was and is a beginning.

But why do we continue year after year to anticipate through the season of Advent an event which has already occurred? Are we simply playing a game of pretending? God's coming in Jesus is no game. God's coming in Jesus is an event that shattered his time as well as ours. Because Jesus shattered his time and ours, we find ourselves remembering yesterday and looking forward to tomorrow. Advent assures us God will continue to come to us in surprising ways.

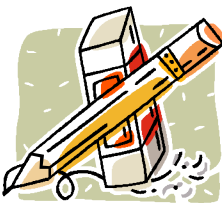

### Trustees

Notes from the September and October meetings.

**Financial Report:** We are ahead on income and have had favorable variances on expenses. There was \$1300 solicited for the music fund. The 18-month CD came due, generating \$6,000 in interest income which had not been accrued.



**Building committee:** The gutter work was finished, and the door repairs are to be done in about a week. Trustees will prioritize a list of repairs needed in the future.

**Memorial Garden:** A brochure will be printed and put in the pews. The plaques have been ordered. Next spring there will be a second tier of plantings.

**Organ/Endowment Project:** Three companies were asked for bids to refurbish the organ. Ericksen, Christian & Associates were chosen. A good source of information regarding organs is on the internet at [www.organs.com](http://www.organs.com). We have copies of the building code and will need to determine what is required. It is possible that the cotton wiring will need to be rewired. A report will be presented at next month's meeting.

**Communications:** The logo has been designed to be used on all church publications. Approval is needed from the communications committee for all church related publications to help standardize information, use of logos, type fonts, etc. The committee is putting

together a guide with logos, fonts, typefaces, etc. to be used in church publications.

**Adult Education Project:** This committee has cataloged the books and has a computer but needs additional space for more books to be added to the library. The objective of the library is to retain the classic volumes, dispense with the outdated items and add more information for resources. The committee will develop a plan detailing how many books we have now and how many they plan to add to see how much space is needed and what type of space is wanted (chairs, tables, other furniture).

**Building Use Approval:** Approved allowing Cook County use the church as a polling place on March 16, 2004 for elections.

**Water Dispenser in Kitchen:** A water dispenser will be installed in the kitchen. The estimated cost from Nicolet would be \$6.92 per 5 gallon jug. After we have determined usage (over a 3-6 month period) we would get competitive bids.

**Building.** A vote was held 9/3/2003 to approve additional painting expenditure of \$960. The proposed cost for the north quadrant was \$3600 and the actual was \$3900.. The north side eaves and fascia need painting which is not included in the rotation plan, cost is \$660. There is money in the budget.

Approved adding a static IP address as part of the new website design at an additional cost of \$15 per month.

Approved the Minolta MBS service contract to supply toner, developer, replacement parts and repairs at a cost of \$4,320.

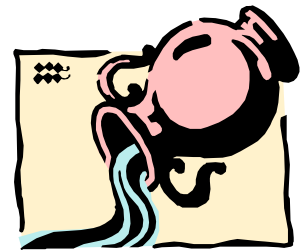

## Christmas Joy Offering

A Presbyterian tradition for almost seventy years, the Christmas Joy Offering is one of the four special offerings designated by the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) to provide congregations direct ways of supporting specific causes that help those in need. The receipts from the offering are distributed equally to the Board of Pensions for assistance programs and to the National Ministries Division of the General Assembly Council to support Presbyterian racial ethnic schools and colleges.

To help retired church workers and their surviving spouses, the board offers Income Supplements. The Shared Grant Program and Emergency Assistance Grants are open to all current and retired church workers.

The Presbyterian Church has long promoted education through establishing and supporting racial ethnic Schools. The Christmas Joy offering funds help with basic operating costs and provides scholarships. The schools supported are: Barber-Scotia College, Cook College and Theological School, Knoxville College, Menaul School, Presbyterian Pan American School, Sheldon Jackson College and Stillman College.

If your last name begins with M-Z, please bring a side dish, hot and ready to serve.

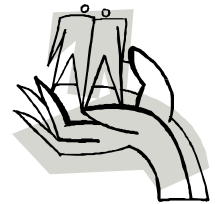

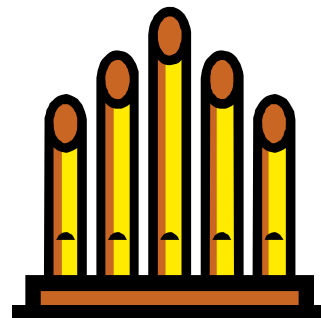
#### Maud Beard Bequest, Organ Repairs

The Trustees are pleased to report Session has approved the use of the Maude Beard bequest to do much needed repairs and upgrades to our Moeller Pipe Organ.

Maude and Hank Beard donated the organ in 1968. Mr. Beard worked for Moeller at that time and oversaw the building and installation of the organ. In 1984 when renovations were made to the church, Maude made a donation in Hank's memory for additional work and expansion of the organ to enhance the music program. We feel the family would be pleased that we are using funds left by Mrs. Beard to once again enhance the music program by doing this upgrade to the organ.

The organ will be converted from a manual stop system to solid state. While we currently have electrical switching and combination action these have numerous moving contacts. Through use and years many of the contacts are now worn out. Stops do not respond to being pushed and registration is unpredictable. We have several stops that do not work at all. The needed upgrades will allow our musicians to take full advantage of the instrument.

The work is scheduled to take place after Christmas. It will take almost a month to complete. Watch as the work progresses. We look forward to dedicating the instrument in late January with a special service.
