Dear Friends in Christ,

I wish I had one dollar for every time someone has said to me: *I don't believe in organized religion*. I normally reply: *So, do you like disorganized religion?* To that, I usually get a blank stare. When Sherri hears me give this response, she often warns me not to be cynical.

The gripes are about what happens in most churches in America: poor attendance, bad music, clergy incompetence, mean-spirited congregations, and preoccupation with survival. I've heard it all.

Professor, preacher, and author Barbara Brown Taylor's experience is like mine when she says: *I almost never hear about the intellectualization of faith, which strikes me as a far greater danger than anything else on the list*. Taylor also says:

*In an age of information overload, when a vast variety of media delivers news faster than most of us can digest it – when many of us have at least two email addresses, two telephone numbers, and one fax number – the last thing any of us needs is more information about God. We need the practice of (God in the flesh), by which God saves the lives of those whose intellectual assent has turned as dry as dust, who have run frighteningly low on the bread of life, who are dying to know more God in their bodies. Not more about God. More God.*

Carl Jung at the end of his life said he was not aware of a single patient in the second half of life whose problems could not have been solved by contact with what he called, *The Numinous*, and which we call God.

Most come to church with a need which, were it verbalized, would sound like this: *I need God. Not the God of intellect and discussion groups, but the God who can turn my dull life into a life of Godly service and delight*.

To meet that need of *knowing more God in (our) bodies* is what we at The Presbyterian Church of Barrington aim for in our ministry.

### Living Waters for the World

#### PCB Embraces New Mission

When you think of water what comes to mind? Do you think of a cool bottle of Perrier on a hot summer's day, or perhaps you think about exotic waterfalls or pristine mountain lakes? Bubbling hot water to create a masterpiece pasta dish might come to mind. Babies being baptized are another way we use this most precious resource.

One might have these typical images if you are raised in the United States or another technologically advanced country. Here are some sobering facts about water:

1. Over 3 million people die annually from preventable water-borne diseases and most of them are children.
2. More than one billion people worldwide do not have access to clean water.
3. Every 15 seconds, a child dies from a preventable, water-related disease.
4. 40 billion hours are lost annually to hauling water, a chore primarily undertaken by women and girls.

5. Scarcity of water has caused more refugees than all the wars in history.

While some organizations are helping to improve the availability of water or its fair distribution, *Living Waters for the World's* niche is to clean a community's existing water source. *Living Waters for the World* (LWW) is a mission resource of the Synod of Living Waters of the Presbyterian Church (USA). LWW trains and equips a mission team to share the gift of clean water with communities all over the world in need. Churches of all denominations are welcome to join in the vision of "Clean Water for ALL of God's Children!"

The Presbyterian Church of Barrington has, to date, seven new missionaries who are creating a new team for LWW to reach out to the global community: Barbara Schwartz, Chairperson, Eric Enskat, Lynda Wyss, Ron Polasek, Janet Hirsch, Fred Lewis, and Chris Schiller. We think it is important to note our former member, Karen Tobin, planted the seeds for this mission outreach. The PCB LWW will

begin their mission work by attending Clean Water U this July and September at the Hopewell Camp & Conference Center in Oxford, MS. Four members will receive the required training prior to planning the first mission trip to install an ROS system (Reverse Osmosis and Softening). Each team must complete three core classes prior to selecting a destination community they will covenant with for a minimum of four years. Once the ROS is installed, two follow-up trips are planned for trouble-shooting, but more importantly, to sustain the new covenant.

We are excited about our new work for all of God's children and thank the Mission Committee for all their support.

### Habitat for Humanity

On Saturday, May 1st, a group of volunteers from the church met at the new Habitat for Humanity house that is being restored by the Barrington branch: Joyful Hands Habitat for Humanity. Recently, Habitat has found that it is more cost effective to buy distressed houses in this market and restore them, rather than build new houses from the ground up. Our house, at 1265 Navajo, Carpentersville is located in the Barrington school district and has great potential. Last

week's volunteers Mark Layne, Cathy Layne, Paige Unangst, Gerry Nadig, Travis Wiersma, John Dawson, Skip Dolan, Rich Barbour, and Barrie Heath completely re-roofed the house in one day. We were ably assisted by the new owner-to-be, Norma. She is required under the contract with Habitat to do 200 hours of volunteer work on the house. When the house is ready, she and her teenage daughter will move in and assume the mortgage.

Jobs on the project ranged from picking up shingles and throwing them in the dumpster, to major repairs on the rafters where water and ants had done some serious damage. Everyone was able to participate in a meaningful way and I must say we felt a sense of accomplishment when we were finished; seeing the excitement in Norma's eyes was not the least of our positive experiences. ## Stephen Ministry

I had the privilege of attending a Stephen Leader Training Course in St. Louis with Reverend Dawn Haeger April 11 through April 17<sup>th</sup>. I was amazed that my spiritual journey had led me there. In 2004, my husband had been a Stephen Minister for almost two years, when watching him and being nudged by others, I applied. After serving as a Stephen Minister for the past five years, I was asked to train as a Stephen Leader. Then Dawn and I were off for a wonderfully spiritual week in St. Louis!

After a five and a half hour drive, we arrived just in time to check in and pick up our 35 pound manual for the course before we attended the opening night banquet and evening session. We were kept quite busy the entire week with classes from morning into the evening. Plus, there was homework and preparation for each day. Luckily, the “manual” consists of color-coded files in a very organized system and everything was easy to follow.

There were 316 attendees at this conference, and this was the 174<sup>th</sup> Stephen Leader’s Training Course. Sixty-four pastors attended and 161 of us were already trained Stephen Ministers. Attendees were from thirty-four states and four Canadian provinces. There were a total of two hundred and twenty congregations. Twenty-six of the churches that attended have had the Stephen Ministry program in their church for over twenty years!

Reverend Ken Haugk, a pastor and clinical psychologist, founded Stephen Ministries in 1975 as a way to equip members of his church to help meet the pastoral needs of the congregation and the community. Other churches soon became interested, and now there are over 10,000 congregations enrolled in the program. This represents more than 150 denominations from all fifty states, ten Canadian provinces, and twenty-four

other countries. At our conference, the 60,000<sup>th</sup> person to register for Leadership Training attended and was presented with a gift for his church.

Although the days were rather long, they were quite enjoyable. Imagine spending at least twelve hours a day in a banquet room with over three hundred Christians eager to learn about this incredible program and share it with their congregations. It was an informative, uplifting, and awesome spiritual experience, and I loved every minute of it.

In every step of the process, I felt blessed that our church had the foresight to send a dynamic group (Nancy Dolan, Nancy Nadig, Linda McGurer, and Dan Spike) to attend

Leaders’ Training together in 2001 to begin our program. These dedicated individuals lovingly set the foundation for the very successful program that we have in our church today. The Stephen Leaders have continued to stay true to the system which has made our program grow and improve. I learned that pastoral support is absolutely essential for this program to work. Not only do our pastors support it, they have had Stephen Ministry training and so have their spouses. What a blessing!

Many thanks for all the lovely cards I received during the week in St. Louis. I felt very loved and supported by the congregation, and I look forward to serving our church as a Stephen Leader in this ministry.

## Rev. Haeger's Letter

As I was to preach on Pentecost, I spent time reading the psalm assigned by the lectionary for that day when I was struck by the dissonance of the psalmist's words and the tragic events unfolding in the Gulf of Mexico.

*Psalm 104* is a glorious hymn praising God the Creator. Verses 24-26 acclaim God's creation of the sea and all that is in it. "O Lord, how manifold are your works! In wisdom you have made them all; the earth is full of your creatures. Yonder is the sea, great and wide, creeping things innumerable are there, living things both great and small. The psalm moves on to praise God for the gift of life and glorifies God. "May the glory of the Lord endure forever; may the Lord rejoice in his works – who looks on the earth and it trembles...I will sing to the Lord as long as I live...May my meditation be pleasing to him"(vv. 31-34).

How pleasing can it be to the God of creation that the meditation of humanity has wrought such destruction upon the sea and all the life contained and sustained by it?

My heart grieves every time I turn on my television or computer and see images of crude oil flowing into the life giving waters of the Gulf of Mexico. Hearing stories of the economic destruction being realized by families and communities that live in the Gulf region infuriates me. While the politicians and BP executives

point fingers and want to know whom to blame, I cannot escape the unpopular realization that we 21<sup>st</sup> century Americans share some of the responsibility for this disaster.

Over and over scientists have told us that our unhealthy dependence upon crude oil is not sustainable and contributes to the destruction of the planet upon which we live. Yet, we continue to live as though this does not need to worry us. It certainly doesn't change the way most of us live in any meaningful manner.

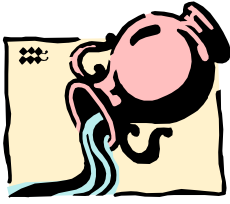
Paul tells us that creation is groaning and longing for redemption. One cannot watch the news and deny the truth of that. We must make a choice. Will we continue to add to the misery of God's planet Earth or will we engage in an honest evaluation of our lifestyles and make some difficult changes? The choice cannot be ignored and each of us must decide.

In the final analysis, I pray my life reflects respect for God's creation and awe for the Creator. I want to sing as the psalmist does, and hope my choices are acceptable to God. "May my meditation be pleasing to him, for I rejoice in the Lord...Bless the Lord, O my soul. Praise the Lord"(vv. 34, 35b).

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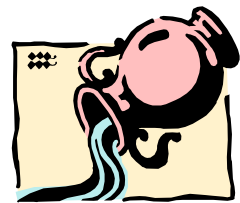

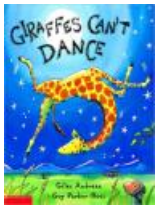
##### Creation and Living as Caretakers
