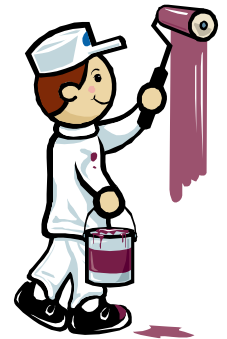

Dear Friends in Christ,

Peter Drucker wrote a book titled *The Age of Discontinuity*. In that book, he made the observation that from the time before Jesus up until the beginning of the 20th century, the mode for transportation and getting things done was one and the same: the horse. With the invention of the motor, there began a radical shift from the way things had been done for thousands

of years. No one knew where it would lead, but now we do.

By the dawn of this 21st century we have discovered that the world no longer depends on horses. Our world simply doesn't work that way anymore. The playing fields are not relegated to a few privileged countries, but open to everyone. Thomas Friedman made that clear in his book, *The World is Flat*.

And beyond that, things are changing so rapidly that our minds can't catch up. Look at these facts that can make your head spin:

The U.S. Department of Labor estimates that today's learner will have 10 to 14 jobs by age 38.

According to the U.S. Department of Labor, 1 out of 4 workers today is working for a company for whom they have been employed less than 1 year.

More than 1 out of 2 are working for a company for whom they have worked less than 5 years.

According to former Secretary of Education, Richard Riley, the top 10 jobs that will be in demand in 2010 didn't exist in 2004.

We are currently preparing students for jobs that don't yet exist – jobs that will be using technologies that haven't yet been invented, in order to solve problems we don't even know are problems yet.

More than 3,000 new books are published daily.

It is estimated that a week's worth of the New York Times contains more information than a person was likely to come across in a lifetime in the 18th century.

For the students starting a four-year technical degree, this means that half of what they learn in their first year of study will be outdated by their third year of study.

What will remain the same is our need for moments of silence and the need for a human face to share the journey of life.

I pray for a church willing to offer those moments of silence in worship and human faces to share the journey of life.

Bread For The World: Offering of Letters, May 18, 2008

If you thought 42 cents could save a person's life, would you spend it? If you believed 4 minutes of your time would help provide a village with clean water, would you give it? Most of us would say, "Yes, of course!" to both questions. You are going to have that opportunity on May 18th.

In our church, we help fight global hunger through the mission programs of the General Assembly, the Presbytery and our own Church. Each of these efforts is effective in its own way. However, the problems are so severe and the challenges are so great that the government must help as well.

Extreme poverty and hunger literally kill people. Today, there are over 1.1 billion people who live on less than \$1 a day. This is a situation that can and must change. People of faith from many denominations all over the world are challenged by this problem.

This year, we want our congressmen and senators to support legislation to increase our spending on this type of aid. Currently, we spend less than 1/2 of 1% of the federal budget on hunger-related issues. Last year, we as a country agreed to increase our contributions. We want to make sure this happens again. Please help by writing a letter on your own or using the sample letter provided and forwarding it to your congressmen and senators on or before May 18. Stephen Ministry

Who benefits from Stephen Ministry? The most obvious answer is the person who receives care. He or she no longer has to walk alone through life's struggles. A Stephen Minister walks alongside this person for as long as he or she needs care, bringing Jesus' unconditional love and acceptance to the person. Care receivers often reflect on how much their faith has grown because of the care of a Stephen Minister during a time of crisis.



People feel cared for in their time of need. We can offer Stephen Ministry to our friends at church, and friends who do not worship with us at PCB. The creators of the Stephen Ministry program report that the most successful local programs are ones in which the entire congregation is actively involved in making referrals to the program.

Curt Baxter and Dan Spike also benefit from Stephen Ministry. Stephen Ministry was begun by a pastor who realized that he could not meet all the needs for care by himself and he needed a way to keep people from slipping through the cracks. Stephen Ministers give pastors a way to make sure people get the care they need. Our pastors know that people in need are receiving quality confidential Christian care, for as long as they need it, from a Stephen Minister.

Stephen Ministers and Stephen Leaders also benefit. Although they participate in the ministry out of a desire to serve and care for others, they encounter tremendous growth themselves. Because of confidentiality they cannot tell you anything about their care receivers, but they can tell you how they have grown personally and spiritually by seeing Jesus work through them to change the life of another person.

The entire congregation benefits from Stephen Ministry. People do not slip through the cracks.

We have all known someone in crisis who doesn't know where to turn. Someone who is tense, upset, worn out – needing someone to talk with, needing someone to care. You would like to help, but how? There are three easy steps when offering Stephen Ministry:

1. Listen and care for your friend in your own relationship together.
2. Ask your friend for permission to share his or her need with someone who can help. Be sure to tell your friend that all information will be kept confidential.
3. Once permission is given, report his or her need as promptly as possible. You can do this by speaking to **Julie Brown** or to **Curt Baxter or Dan Spike, 847-381-0975**. A Stephen Minister will then be assigned to your friend, if that is what is agreed upon. Thanks for being an active member of our Stephen Ministry congregation!

Deacon's Corner, Alexandra Bernardi



I am one of the incoming Deacons; I am probably also the youngest member among this wonderful group. I'm young in my role, young in my faith, but growing every day and happy to be doing something so worthwhile.

Some of my friends were surprised that I am a "Deacon." It sounds so formal and official to them. One acquaintance even asked me if I was able to marry people! (That would be something...) My emotions were similar when I was first asked: I was surprised and felt unworthy; then I felt flattered to be considered and now I'm plain honored to serve our church and its community in this way.

I say "young in my faith" because I realized a few years ago that I was taking my religion for granted. Growing up in Switzerland, one was either Catholic or Protestant. Ulrich Zwingli was the name of our protestant reformer and his ideas are closest to Presbyterianism as I've come to know it here in the U.S. Anyway, I was raised Protestant. My memories of Sunday school are warm: simple bible stories and songs. As a teenager, though, I had a hard time relating to anything our pastor was teaching. Going to church was considered a chore, something that had to be done 16 times a year in order to be eligible for confirmation. We went begrudgingly, listened and sang, but I would not go so far as to say we worshipped.

At university, I was suddenly amongst all sorts of religions from all over the world and some looked quite appealing. But when the time came to make a commitment before God to my husband and later children, I suddenly realized that there was only ONE faith for me and that was the Presbyterian faith: I was planted and grounded in it and did not want to be transplanted.

Since then, I cherish the times I get to go to church and listen and learn about God's word. I welcome being part of this community and I appreciate that I have a spiritual home at the Presbyterian Church of Barrington. Serving as a deacon is the least I can do to show my gratitude.

Exciting DISCIPLE News

Join us from May 18 – June 1 in Fellowship Hall to learn about two new DISCIPLE course offerings for this coming autumn season.

The Adult Christian Education Committee will be offering the fourth class in this series entitled “Under the Tree of Life.” This 32-week course will delve into the Writings of the Old Testament. The Writings include Ruth; 1, 2 Chronicles; Ezra; Nehemiah; Esther; Job; Psalms; Proverbs; Ecclesiastes; Song of Solomon; Lamentations; and Daniel. New Testament Scriptures will include The Gospel of John; 1, 2, 3 John; James; Jude; and Revelations.



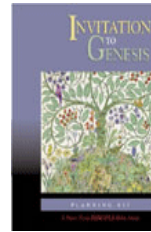
The word Under in the title is meant to convey invitation, welcome, sheltering, security, and rest—home at last!

Emphasis on the Psalms in Israel’s hymnbook and prayer book leads naturally to an emphasis on worship in study. Present through the entire study is the sense of living toward completion, toward the climax of the message and the promise, extravagantly pictured in a special video in Lesson 31 of Revelation.

For those of you that have heard of our DISCIPLE classes but did not have the time to commit to a 32-week class; your prayers have been answered! We are offering a new SHORT 10-WEEK format offered on two different days so you can fit one into your busy schedule. An Invitation to Genesis approaches the Book of Genesis not simply as a story of the beginning, but as a story of beginnings from start to finish. Witness anew this opening book of the Hebrew Bible and understand more clearly God’s purpose in the

beginning to form a people from Adam all the way through Joseph and into the nation of Israel.

You will read Genesis in light of other biblical passages



from Psalms, John 1, and Galatians, to mention just a few. The study book was authored by Peter Enns, Professor of Old Testament, and Biblical Hermeneutics at Westminster

Theological Seminary in Glenside, PA.

The accompanying video segments feature five other biblical scholars to

enrich the discussions.

“Disciple IV: Under the Tree of Life”, will be held on Saturday mornings from 8:30 – 11:00 a.m. and costs only \$60 per student. First class is on September 6, 2008. It concludes in May 2009.

“An Invitation to Genesis” will be offered on Tuesdays from 1:00 – 2:30 p.m. and costs only \$20 per student. The first class is on Tuesday, September 2. It will also be offered on Sunday mornings! Classes will start 20 minutes after worship concludes. First class will be on Sunday, September 7. Both classes will end two weeks before Thanksgiving.

Please prayerfully consider if this is the time for you to covenant with a small group of others seeking a deeper understanding of God’s Word to us all. Bring your Bibles and notebooks to class. All other materials are provided.

Fun and Faith in May

May is a busy month in the life of our congregation with a promised parent/youth 3-legged kick ball game on Sunday the 4th after church, Mother’s Day on Sunday the 11th and Memorial Day Weekend falling over the 25th.

Please do not miss this opportunity to check them out and sign up for the one which speaks to the heart of your walk in faith calling you to a new and deeper relationship with our risen Lord.

Adult Education: Speaking of Worship

We have been talking and thinking a lot lately about our worship services and Adult Education times and how some proposed changes might enable us to live more faithfully as Christ's followers in this place. Discernment of the ways God is calling us in this process to be more faithful witnesses to the Kingdom of God is a difficult and care-ridden process. An old friend since undergraduate days, 19th Century, Danish theologian, Søren Kierkegaard, wrote in *Purity of Heart*, about what he observed of the worship practices of congregations in his day. He observed that those gathered would often sit as if at the theater waiting for those leading to touch, inspire, or entertain them, as if actors on the stage.

Kierkegaard challenged a reformation of the hearts we bring to our gatherings for common worship. He asked that our hearts become not the audience but the actors, allowing our worship leaders to open them to their own acts of worship and to the life of the Word proclaimed. He asked that we allow our hearts be open to the choir's inspiring in them the singing of their praises to God. He asked that we allow our hearts in worship to be open to God in new and ever faithful ways; aware that God is at once the Scriptor of all that we do and the audience or receiver in worship of our offering of our hearts of love in worship and praise.

Wherever our thinking and talking about worship and our Adult Education schedules take us as the people of God in this place, the following *Practices of Preparation for*

Worship might be of some value to us as we journey together seeking to open our hearts in worship and to the guidance of the Word in discerning God's leading in our midst:

- * Arrive early, sit quietly, make use of the "Prayer of Preparation"
- * Pray for the worship leaders and the choir
- * Ask that the Spirit make herself known.
- * Expect to hear God speak the Word that you most need to hear.
- * Pay attention to what you are really feeling, behind all that stuff of the daily-ness of life.
- * Expect that God is "in all things" and may come to you in any way and in any part of the service.
- * Pay attention to the printed words in the bulletin; affirm them in your heart as you speak them. How do you hear them deeply within?
- * Pay attention to the words of the hymns and to the meanings in the music. Where do they speak to the deepest part of your journey?
- * Join your heart with the choir when it sings.
- * Pay attention to the pastoral prayer and ask God to lead your heart in new directions of love and mercy.
- * During the silent confession offer all that you are, that separates yourself from the love of God, up to God for healing.
- * Thank God for the love and grace and mercy shown you in the service.
