There is nothing quite like spring. In this season of dogwood and tulips, of the sweet scent of lilacs and the dazzle of rhododendron, it’s easy to sense God’s glory everywhere. Every year at about this time I can’t get off my mind the words of poet e.e. cummings:

*I thank thee God for most this amazing day
or the leaping greenly spirits of trees
and a blue true dream of sky
and for everything
which is natural which is infinite
which is yes.*

In recent months, as I have watched various documentaries and read several books about our environment, I find myself asking this question, What is becoming of this small, fragile planet drifting through space? Since the 2007 report of the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change, which is the world’s official agency for studying the environment, the argument about climate change is over. The earth is warming at an alarming rate, and all but a very few are convinced that the polluting of our planet will only get worse as new economies such as in China and India strive to achieve the standard of living we have in the U.S. We are already seeing ominous consequences: melting ice caps, glaciers shrinking at an increasingly fast rate, intensifying storms and droughts, rising coastal waters.

James Hansen of NASA, probably the world’s most significant climate modeler, has said that the earth has ten years to start producing less carbon dioxide instead of more. If it fails we will have a *different planet*.

The British scientist James Lovelock, who built the equipment that allows us to measure deterioration of the ozone layer, said that he believes *the tipping point* has already passed and that the earth is careening toward a worse disaster and on a faster time scale than almost anyone realizes. New reports trickle out in the news almost every day of water supplies, animal species, and habitats at risk. But so far, it is still by and large business as usual in this country. Climate change isn't a serious issue in America. It

ranks far down the list of Americans' concerns in the polls.

It seems that there are two great issues the human race must face if it is ultimately to survive and thrive. The first is, can we learn to deal with our differences without turning to violence and war? And the second is, can we muster the vision and courage to stop the destruction of the earth before it is too late?

Beginning **Sunday, June 6th**, I will be teaching a class entitled, ***Life in the Garden: Considering "A New Climate for Theology."*** In the class, we will learn about the Economy of God, in which all of nature, all of life is held in God's love, and there is enough for everyone. We will learn about how the prophets taught that God created a world in which everything is connected. The class will meet each Sunday at 11:15 a.m. and each Wednesday at 7:00 p.m., June 6th through June 23rd. We will be reading Sally McFague's new book, ***A New Climate for Theology***.

An assumption of the class is that we are facing issues of climate change. We will not be debating how climate change has occurred and continues to occur. We will be investigating the theological doctrines and philosophical assumptions that have encouraged human behavior and choices leading to our current situation. I look forward to leading ***Life in the Garden: Considering "A New Climate for Theology"*** and hope that you will enthusiastically join in this adventure.

Rev. Haeger's Letter

Spring is in the air, birds are singing, flowers are blooming and children can be heard on the playgrounds of their schools. This is exactly as it should be. Sadly, however, this is not true in all school yards. Over the last few weeks, I have been so disturbed to see on the news the recent rash of violence of teens against other teens. Both in Florida and Massachusetts, young women have been cut down in the prime of their lives.

Florida resident, Josie Lou Ratley, was the victim of a brutal beating at the hands of a boy she had never met after a flurry of vicious text messages exchanged between her and other teens. Phoebe Prince of Northampton, Massachusetts, the victim of extreme bullying both in the halls of her school and through emails, texts and social media forums, was so overwhelmed by the pain she was experiencing, she took her own life.

Violence in the lives of adolescents seems so incompatible to what we think the life of teens should be. When many of us remember our teenage years, we think of high school dances, football games and sleepovers. However, intentional violence and suicide are the second and third highest causes of death for people aged 10-24. Added to the tragedy of the deaths of Josie Lou Ratley and Phoebe Prince is the common feature they share. Both young people were victimized by a new phenomenon known as cyberbullying or electronic aggression.

Fortunately, most teenagers do not report being harassed by others who utilize instant-messaging, texting or social media. The bad news is that the numbers of those being persecuted doubled between 2000 and 2005 (Journal of Adolescent Health, 2007).

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention have begun researching this problem and sharing suggestions with parents and others who work with young people. First and foremost, the CDC instructs adults to stay informed about new devices and technology that our teens are using. While that may seem overwhelming, it may be critical to your child's safety and well-being. Talking about harassment, cyberbullying and ways to protect themselves while utilizing technology safely and wisely is also necessary to keep our teens protected.

Being bullied, whether face-to-face or via technology, is not just a normal part of growing up. It violates the image of God in each young person, damages self-esteem and creates a culture of fear. The long-term effects of bullying can be devastating to the victims. "Researchers have found that years later, long after the bullying has stopped, adults who were bullied as teens have higher levels of depression and poorer self-esteem than other adults." (www.safeyouth.org)

Being involved in the lives of our young people is important for the quality of lives they lead now as well as in the future. I urge you to take the time to talk with your sons and daughters about what is happening in school and on-line. They are precious to us; let's do all that we can to ensure their happiness and safety.

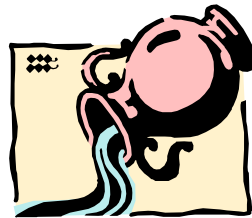

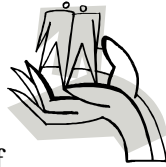
