Davar Ardalan is a Supervisory Producer at NPR News in Washington D.C. *My Name Is Iran* is the insightful telling of the odyssey of three generations of women torn between two beloved, but divided homelands: Iran and the United States of America. Drawing on her family history, informed by her father's love of architecture and her mother's historical and religious scholarship, Ardalan's family saga sweeps back and forth between East and West, between tradition and modernity. Ms. Ardalan reveals a country and family inextricably linked to one another as well as the shifts of history, politics and culture.

Ahmad Sadri, Ph.D., Professor, Sociology & Anthropology, Lake Forest College; Gorter Chair of Islamic World Studies.

Dr. Ahmad Sadri received his BA and MA degrees at the University of Tehran and his PhD from the New School for Social Research. He has authored more than five books, served as a columnist for *Daily Star of Lebanon* and a commentator at National Public Radio in Chicago.

He will speak on the social, cultural, political and religious milieu in Iran. Understanding Iran today requires insight into three different but deeply intertwined cultural dimensions: Iran's Islamic identity, its Pre-Islamic Persian character and the modern nationhood it is struggling to create. Dr. Sadri will illuminate these, giving clarity to our understanding of Iran as context for deeper understanding of Ms. Ardalan's journey and our own.

Dear Friends in Christ,

On November 1st, we will celebrate All Saints Day which is the Sunday when we commemorate the saints known and unknown to us who have joined Christ who is enthroned in heaven. Often, in my ministry I have noted that as people prepare for the end of life, they regret not what they have done, but what they have left undone.

Age and time should encourage us to say what needs to be said and do what needs to be done in the time we have to do it. A loose translation from *The Letter of James* says, "Those who fail to do what they have to do in the time they have to do it completely miss the target of life."

Poet Linda Pastan has written eloquently on the regret that comes from standing on the bank and shivering while life calls us to dive in. Pastan wrote:

*I waited for my life to start
For years, standing at bus stops
Looking into the curved distance
Thinking each bus was the wrong bus;
Or lost in books where I would travel
Without luggage from one page
To another; where the only breeze
Was the rustle of pages turning?
And lives rose and set
In the violent colors of suns.*

Successful St. Greg's Fundraising and Golf Outing

The 21st Annual Golf Outing to provide scholarships to the students attending St. Greg's High School was a great success. On Monday, October 5, with 20 golfers attacking the Makray Memorial Golf Club combined with excellent fall weather, it was a memorable afternoon. The winning foursome this year was Jim Ledinsky, Byron Johnson, Rich Peterson and Gerry Nadig, with a score of 7 under par. The individual prize went to Bill Buchta for longest drive. The students came out while we were playing golf and were treated to driving and putting lessons from "Tiger" Mark Layne. Our sincere thanks to all those who played golf; as well as the more than two dozen families who contributed to the fund this year. We have collected over \$30,000 for the scholarship fund so far this year.

The community program which started as San Marcos Urban Youth Mission and then changed into Nueva Esperanza, has come to an end. Although the program was ended two years ago, our Church committed to seeing that all the students who were in the program at that time had a chance to graduate at St. Greg's. This year the last four seniors will be graduating. Since we first began this program in 1989, our Church has touched the lives of 85 students, providing 205 scholarships to those students. Of the 85 students, 29 of them were sponsored for the full four years at St. Greg's. In addition, our Church supported a community organization which was dedicated to changing the lives of "at risk students from at risk

families" on the north side of Chicago. Over the years this program included sports, music, community activities and summer camp.

Everyone who has been a part of this program should be proud of what has been accomplished over the past twenty-one years. Many people have supported this program and given of their time, talents and treasures. Thank you all for your faithful support through these years. - ... **after** the doctor says, "I'm sorry, but there's nothing more we can do."
- ... **after** the nursing home director shakes your hand and says, "Welcome to your new home."
- ... **after** the last child honks the horn, waves, and drives away—and the house suddenly seems empty.
- ... **after** the gavel goes down, the handcuffs go on, and your loved one is led away.
- ... **after** the baby arrives, demanding more of you than you ever dreamed possible.
- ... **after** you find a pink slip with your final paycheck.
- ... **after** your family and friends have heard your story one too many times, but you still need to talk it out.



Stephen Ministers are the "After People." They are ready to come alongside you—or your friends, neighbors, coworkers, or relatives—and provide comfort and support for as long **after** as needed. 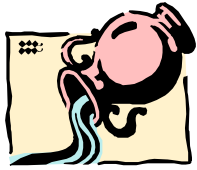

Deacon's Corner, Gus Leep

The door into the hallway was slightly open. I knocked. "Come in", said a soft voice. I entered and was met by an elderly lady with a walker. I introduced myself.

"Flowers for you with good wishes from the church."



"How lovely," she said. "Won't you please come in for a few minutes?" I did. We talked about her family, including her granddaughter's turtle, Dribble.

Shortly, "I must go," I said. "more flowers to deliver." "The flowers are just beautiful. Thank you so much." I left. What a pleasant visit, I thought. Two more visits with the same experience. Lovely. So satisfying.

When I first visited him, he had been flat on his back for over two years. Many in our church were praying for him. Fed through a feeding tube. His breathing assisted by a tube in his throat and down his wind pipe. He couldn't talk because of it. I began visiting him twice a week, telling him jokes. He either smiled or rolled his eyes to the ceiling in a "that's awful" look. The jokes went on, out of a book. After many weeks, he forced himself to croak out a few words. More time passed. The breathing tube was removed for a few hours each day. No more hand-held chalk board and chalk. More time passed. He was deeply depressed. "I'll never get out of here. I'll die here." Tears.

Two days later I was back for another visit. I walked into his room. He was sitting in a chair with his feet up on the bed. "Hi, Gus. Put your butt in that chair, slide on over and let's talk." The right room? The same man I left two days earlier? He talked for over an hour about his life: how he and his wife had met, where they had lived, what jobs he had held and how they ended up in Barrington. A miracle right before my eyes! I left dancing. God's Holy Spirit had touched him and me. "Pick up your bed and walk." Get some exercise. Start walking to the shower, walk the hallway. Start eating soft solid food. Let your body begin to heal itself. You

can do it." Time passed. He went home. Came regularly to church. I asked him how his miraculous healing had occurred. "Prayer," he said.

Deacons don't get paid. We get rewards.

Food Served with love

Food is part of life. It does not matter how busy we get or how worried we are; sooner or later most of us have got to stop to eat. When I was growing up my family visited my grandparents in rural Appalachia during the summer. I can remember many Sunday dinners with family and guests. Everyone brought food they made themselves. I remember Grandma's fried chicken, my aunt's sweet tea, and casseroles of all types. I remember zucchini bread, and 7up pound cake. Food is a big part of life. The preparation of food is work and time and food served with love makes all the difference.

The BPW has done a long and fine job of coordinating the Food Served With Love program and many thanks are due them for their efforts. 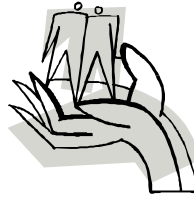
We will study the prayer using games, music, and an art project. We will work in large groups at times and at times it will be just a parent to child interaction. Call the church office to sign up as soon as possible.

A Time for Thanksgiving

In this season of stewardship, it's appropriate to take time to reflect on those who have given of their time, talents and treasures. Although we are behind in our giving versus our need (i.e., pledges vs. budget) we are appreciative of those who dug deeper during our secondary campaign to lessen our shortfall. Please be sure you are up to date on your pledging schedule. We are grateful too for those who have shown up for our occasional Saturday morning workdays. These sessions have contributed greatly to improving the condition and appearance of our building while saving the cost of contracting for the services performed. Painting, trimming, digging, and building storage areas are some of the things we've done at very low cost. We have some very talented members. Good for all of you!

The Building Improvement Group continues to meet to develop information they hope to be able to provide to the congregation by the end of the year concerning a program to create an endowment fund intended to support the long-term maintenance needs of our church building. They are studying both the methods to raise the money needed and the proper vehicle to ensure the continued availability of that money in the future.

Building Condition

You probably won't see most of these projects, but they are vital to the building. We have recently-
 Weather-proofed pipes in the Youth Lounge (donated by a church friend),
 Replaced a furnace/AC serving the Parlor,
 Authorized the rebuilding of the flower planter in the courtyard,
 Built closets, painted and decorated walls and trimmed trees on our workdays.
 We still have these projects ahead of us that are important to the safety and integrity of our church building and property –

Heat tape on roof of Fellowship Hall,
 Foundation crack (water leak) repair,
 Gutters near the Parlor to divert basement floodwater,
 Improvements to the Memorial Garden soil and benches,
 Replace stairway in rear of building,
 and our well-publicized need, replacing the front stairway in the parking lot.
 You can see that the Trustees have a lot on their plates. We are continuing to do our best to make our house of worship a place of which we can all be proud.
