Andrew's other recital engagements have taken him to such venues as; Westminster Abbey, Windsor Castle; and the Cathedrals in London, Truro, Rochester and Chichester.

**Sunday, December 7: Messiah Sing-Along. *Home of the Sparrow.*** Join us for the 3rd annual Messiah Sing-Along performed by professional soloists and orchestra, with additional holiday music by our own PCB Children's Choir. Dear Friends in Christ,

During this election cycle, we are going to hear a great deal about what the framers of *The Declaration of Independence* thought constituted happiness. Obviously, they must have thought that happiness was something that could be achieved because they put the pursuit of happiness right along side "life and liberty." From that time on "life and liberty" have been given vigorous protection. And we have been left to sort out the meaning of "happiness" on our own.

Eduardo Porter, a New York Times reporter and an insightful observer made the following observation about happiness. He said: "Despite all the wealth we

have accumulated – increased life expectancy, central heating, plasma TV's and venti-white-chocolate-mocha Frappuccinos (and 18,000 other choices at Starbucks) – true happiness has lagged our prosperity."

"Most disconcerting" says Porter, "happiness seems to have little relation to economic achievement, which we have historically understood as the driver of well-being. A notorious study in 1974 found that despite some 30 years worth of stellar economic growth, Americans were no happier than they were at the end of World War II. A more recent study found that life satisfaction in China declined between 1994 and 2007, a period in which average real incomes grew by 250 percent."

What is being discovered is this: more money and a lottery win can bring fleeting happy moments. Non-monetary rewards, like more time off, or more time with friends or family are likely to produce more lasting changes in the level of happiness.

Porter's final conclusion: "One thing seems certain: lining up every policy incentive to strive for higher and higher incomes is just going to make us all miserable. Happiness is one of the things that money just can't buy."

Take all the words of Jesus that point to happiness, they boil down to this: Happiness is never found when seeking it directly. Happiness is the by-product of giving yourself to the greatest need and cause you can find in life. Do this and happiness might have a chance of finding its way into your life.

I want to take this opportunity to encourage you to give your time, talent and treasure to the great needs and causes that The Presbyterian Church of Barrington hears Jesus calling us to address. From those who have gone on mission trips, served our youth and worshipped with our family of faith, I know that they have found a measure of happiness through fellowship, service and worship.

## Stephen Ministry

### Learning from the Geese



The Stephen Leaders, Anna, Julie, Nancy, Dan and Susan have been thinking how grateful we are that our church family has embraced and

welcomed Stephen Ministry at the Presbyterian Church of Barrington. We have seen this over the last seven years in the support and encouragement of our Pastors, in the referrals of family members and friends to the care of a Stephen Minister, and even in members themselves asking to be part of this compassionate and confidential Christ-centered Ministry. This partnership among us all has made our church a Stephen Ministry Congregation.

At a recent Stephen Leaders meeting, we shared a Devotion Written by Donna Gray, Minister for Children and Families at Fourth Presbyterian Church in Chicago. Pastor Gray was responding to the Scripture Reading from 1 Corinthians 12:24b-31:

*But God has so arranged the body, giving the greater honor to the inferior member, that there may be no dissension within the body, but the members may have the same care for one another. If one member suffers, all suffer together with it; if one member is honored, all rejoice together with it. Now you are the body of Christ and individually members of it. And God has appointed in the church first apostles, second prophets, third teachers; then deeds of power, then gifts of healing, forms of assistance, forms of leadership, various kinds of tongues. Are all apostles? Are all prophets? Are all teachers? Do all work miracles? Do all possess gifts of healing? Do all speak in tongues? Do all interpret? But strive for the greater gifts. And I will show you a still more excellent way. (NRSV)*

With Donna Gray's permission, here is her reflection on this passage which we Stephen Leaders all feel so beautifully explains Stephen Ministry at PCB:

Naturalists tell us that the goose demonstrates the best of community. Our scripture defines community as an instance when "every part is dependent on every other part." While eagles fly solo, most of the time geese fly together in a V formation. By flying as a flock, geese have at least a 71 percent greater flying range than if each bird were to fly on its own. People who work in community and share a common bond can get where they are going more quickly and at the same time have the joy of sharing a task with another person. When the lead goose gets tired, it drops to the back and another goose assumes the lead position. It pays to have help when a task is difficult. It provides both psychological and spiritual strength to know others will step in and help bear the burden. Furthermore, if a goose gets sick and falls out of formation, two other geese accompany it and remain with it until it recovers. That is a wonderful example in nature of how "every part is dependent on every other part." We don't have to look far this time of year to see community acted out. The church is the body of which Christ is the head. Christ needs each one of us to do our part for this body to be fully functional. How we feel and how we act make a difference to everyone in our church, and it makes a difference to God.

The Stephen Leaders loved learning about Geese from Donna Gray, and also how in both by giving and receiving help, we honor God in our faith Community. Please know that there is a Stephen Minister willing to be by your side and help you to bear your burden large or small. ### Women With Aging Parents

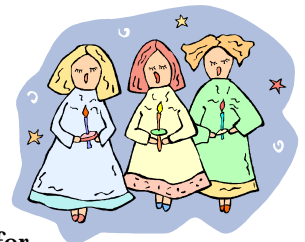

the PCB.

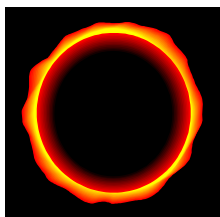
On **November 2nd**, we celebrate All Saint's Day by

many people doing a variety of tasks. Our next day is Saturday, October 18 from 9:00 – noon. Projects will range from painting

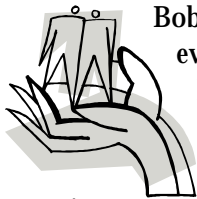
bathrooms to installing new faucets, from building closets to organizing closets, from weeding to tree trimming. To help with project planning, please **email** or **call Diane Reich**

Our kickoff date for 2008 is Make a Difference Day, October 25th. Our bi-annual date is Earth Day which in 2009 is April 22.

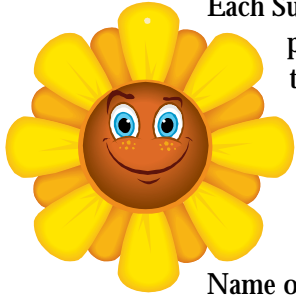
