What is a Carillon?

The carillon is a musical instrument with a history as rich as it is long. For more than five centuries, the carillon has been a voice for the hopes, aspirations and joys of humankind. It consists of at least 23 bells that are controlled by a player from a console or keyboard played with the hands, and pedals played with the feet.

Carillons evolved in the lowlands of Holland, Belgium, and northern France. The rich mercantile towns of the lowlands exhibited their status by installing fine carillons in their church towers and arranging tunes to be played by an automatic mechanism. The town carillonneur played on market days and holidays. It was said that good bells and good schools were the sign of a well-run city.

The Presbyterian Church of Barrington has a history of embracing the carillon. **The Carillon** was the name of PCB's newsletter from the late 1990s until around 2015. You can click [here](#) for a pdf of The Carillon from 20 years ago, this month.

Pastor's Desk

METAMORPHOSIS

Most of us have seen the time-lapse photography of a lowly caterpillar becoming a butterfly. The footage usually starts with a ponderous little worm inching its way along a leaf that it devours. It looks silly and awkward as it labors to cover short distances.

When it gets to about two inches in length, it takes a break from stuffing itself, finds a protective branch, and rigs up a silk thread by which it fastens its tail to that branch. Once secured, this little caterpillar begins to contort its body, gyrating in curious ways. At first, it's unclear what is happening. Then suddenly, the outer skin of this worm seems to unzip revealing a green chrysalis within. Minutes later, the molting is done and the green pod that is left becomes motionless for about 14 days.

Then, pushing itself out of the impossibly small pod, there comes a Monarch butterfly. Wet, trembling, and dark, it takes a few minutes to unfold itself, opening its collapsed wings for the first time. It forces them outward to their full capacity, spreading patterns of color and symmetry on this new canvas. And then this ex-earthbound caterpillar seizes the wind and lifts off, delicately managing the currents like a poem set in motion.

It is one of the wonders of God's world that such drastic transformation takes place. Where there was once an ugly, cumbersome grub, laboring to get to the next leaf, there is now this magnificent butterfly that bears no resemblance to its former self. We almost can't take our eyes off it as it flits from flower to flower in such an effortless and magical way.

The very same word used to describe the transformation of a caterpillar into a butterfly is used by the Bible to describe God's work in us. The word is metamorphosis, and God has that in mind for you: to become so much more than you once were through the extraordinary inner work of the Spirit of God!

What is the true nature of who you are? While homeostasis (maintaining the status quo) is always easiest, metamorphosis releases something much more beautiful and beneficial. This transformation makes it possible for the caterpillar – AND YOU – to thrive in your current environment. It also enables you to adapt to and thrive in the various environments in which you will find yourself.

Becoming something that is able to not only thrive, but be more beautiful, beneficial, and adaptable, and resilient. It is inside work that has major repercussions on outward living. Isn't that what you want God to do in you? That is what Easter is all about.

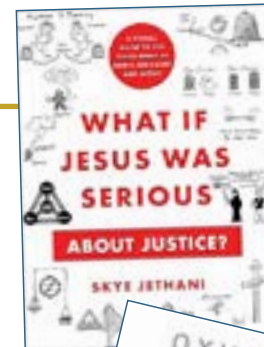
Growing Together In Faith women's evening Bible study meets on the 3rd Tuesday of the month at 7:00 pm via Zoom.

The Session

The Church's Governing Board

The Session consists of Teaching Elders (our pastors) and Ruling Elders drawn from our active membership. Ruling Elders are elected for three-year terms.

Congregational Meeting

The Session has called a congregational meeting for Sunday, April 27th, immediately following the morning worship service. There are two action items: the first is to affirm the action of the Session in contracting with the Rev. David Ezekiel for long-term pastoral services and the second is to dissolve the Senior Pastor Search Committee with thanks.

The text of the first motion is:

Motion: The Session places before the active membership of the Presbyterian Church of Barrington for action a request to endorse and wholeheartedly affirm the decision of the Session, which was made in consultation with the Senior Pastor Search Committee and the Presbytery of Chicago's Committee on Ministry, to contract with the Rev. David Ezekiel for pastoral and leadership services.

Rationale: Having heard the report of the SPSC regarding the search process and criteria, the Session concurs that the best pastoral candidate to lead the church forward in its growth and mission strategy is the Rev. David Ezekiel and recommends the congregation affirm this decision.

The text of the second motion is:

Motion: The Session moves that the Senior Pastor Search Committee, having completed its work, be dissolved and the Presbyterian Church of Barrington thank them for their work, a job well done.

Process: Mark Nokes, the Commission on Ministry representative from the Presbytery of Chicago will moderate the meeting. Voting will be conducted by ballot. And, according to the By-Laws, you must be present onsite and in-person to cast your ballot.

The comprehensive training consists of 50 hours of classes that equips and prepares an individual for this Christian care giving.
